One of my favorite movies of all time is The Spirit of St. Louis about the famed aviator, Charles Lindbergh. By the age of 25, Charles had captured the heart of not only the United States but of the world when he made the first non-stop transatlantic flight from New York to Paris, France. In 1927 Charles Lindbergh went from being a mail carrier to receiving the Medal of Honor by rising to a challenge conceived by the hotel mogul Raymond Orteig. While many aviators attempted to win this prize, it took the tenaciousness of a humble aviator from Michigan to achieve what was thought to be an impossible flight.

Watching the movie, you get a sense of what kind of
